LAY PEOPLE IN THE CHURCH

Trans. by Donald Attwater

This subject, which has come very much to the fore in recent years through the development of Catholic Action, has until now scarcely received a theological treatment. In this volume, which is a translation of Jalons pour une theologie du laicat, the distinguished French theologian has devoted nearly 500 pages to the state of the layman, his place in the Church today and throughout history, the priesthood of the laity, the relationship between the faithful and the hierarchy and such important questions as the relationship between initiative and obedience in the life of the Church. This book is set in the context of man's responsibility for the world and here the conception of catholicity reaches out beyond the simple idea of the Christian destiny of man; it stretches out to include the whole of creation. The Church existed, it is true, before all time in God's mind; but it is also made here and now by us and the theology of the layman involves a new synthesis. The layman has to grasp the divine significance of things and be able to make such decisions and as a Christian he has to do this without being unpleasantly pious; lay people are not pseudo-monks. Lay people have to make decisions not in a spirit of mere complacent obedience to directives but by engaging their own intellects and their own hearts. Père Congar ranges over scripture and tradition, history and the present, councils and decrees, with an ease and harmony which will make of this book a standard text-book for any students of the Church wanting to look beyond mere abstraction or simple description.
