Atlantic Flights

Since the flight from New York to Paris, by Colonel Lindbergh, AFC, was accomplished a little over a month ago, another Atlantic flight has been completed

Messrs Chamberlin and Levine, using a Wright-Bellanca monoplane, took off at Roosevelt Field on June 4th, and 43 hours later they landed at Kottbus, 60 miles south east of Berlin, having covered 4,400 miles and set up the world's long distance record

It is stated that Colonel Minchin and Capt Macintosh of Messrs Imperial Airways, are proposing to fly the Atlantic westwards in a Fokker-Jupiter monoplane. If, as everyone hopes, they are successful, it is not quite clear whether Holland or Great Britain will claim the honours, and the same remarks apply to Captain Courtney's proposed flight to Montreal and back in a Dornier-Napier flying boat.

On hearing of these two projected flights, one cannot help wondering why entirely British machines are not used

Air Records

It is a lamentable fact that at present Great Britain holds no International air records of any sort, either for heavier-than-air, or lighter-than-air machines

It must be apparent not only to the Air Ministry but to British aircraft manufacturers, that this is a matter of the utmost importance, if Great Britain is to maintain her supremacy of the Air, and we are to have a flourishing aircraft industry

The question at once arises how this end can best be achieved, and I believe that if the Royal Aero Club or some other energetic organisation produced a sound scheme for attempting to obtain records, starting in a modest way and bringing back the records one by one, they would then get all the support they require, both financial and otherwise, not only from those directly interested in Aviation, but from the public and the Press
