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THE FAR EASTERN QUARTERLY'S

Principles of Editorial Policy

1. The *Quarterly* will consider for publication articles dealing with all regions of the Far East and relating to all subjects in the humanities and social sciences, but only articles of a general nature in the natural sciences. The approach should be historically descriptive, analytical, and interpretative rather than politically partisan and polemical. Articles will be divided as evenly as possible between Southeast Asia, China, and Japan and Northeast Asia; at times special issues on various countries or topics may be featured.

2. Articles should be of a scholarly nature, the fruits of careful research, thought, and analysis, and should be presented in acceptable literary form. More specifically they should (a) present new or significant materials or translations; or (b) provide new or thought-provoking analyses or interpretations supported by sound evidence; or (c) present in English the results of significant foreign scholarship which otherwise would not be readily available; or (d) present material of immediate professional interest, such as bibliographical material or other aids to research; (e) be adequately documented; (f) be as objective and free from bias as possible; (g) be well organized and presented in a straightforward and lucid style. Technical articles must provide sufficient explanatory material to make their ideas and terminology understandable to a college graduate with some knowledge of the Far East.

3. As a general rule articles and other items will be published in the order of their acceptance, but the Editor has discretion to make necessary adjustments.

4. Before acceptance articles will be approved by the Editor and one other editor. In case of disagreement, the opinion of other specialists will be sought.

5. Special consideration will be given to contributions of high quality submitted by younger scholars and newcomers to the field.

6. Chinese, Japanese, and other types of characters, symbols, etc., will be provided if possible when necessary to present or explain material, but their excessive use should be avoided. Similarly, illustrations, maps, charts, graphs, tables, etc., must be kept to a minimum for the present. The Editor and Press have final authority.

7. Every effort will be made to review, abstract, or translate significant works, articles, and documents published in Far Eastern or less well-known European languages.

8. Long, critical reviews of significant scholarly or interpretative books will be featured in the "Book reviews." Other works will be given briefer notices in the "Bibliographical notes."

9. The "News of the profession" (the name to be given in future issues to "Notes and news") will provide as extensive a coverage as possible of the activities of persons, institutions, and organizations engaged in scholarship relating to the Far East.

10. Whenever possible space will be provided for correspondence and short notes considered of value to scholarship or of interest to Far Easterners.

11. The "Bibliography" will provide as complete yet selected coverage of publications in Western languages as possible. Short annotations will be provided when possible.

12. Articles submitted must conform as nearly as possible to the requirements presented in the "Style sheet" to appear in the November 1948 issue of the *Quarterly*. Material which fails to conform to the "Style sheet" may be returned to the author for retyping.

13. Contributions in which extensive editorial changes are made will be returned to authors for approval, but minor editorial and stylistic changes will be made at the discretion of the editors.

14. Authors of articles will receive 25 free reprints without covers, and reviewers, authors of books reviewed, and publishers will each receive two clippings of reviews.

15. The guiding principle of the *Quarterly* as the journal of The Far Eastern Association, Inc., will be to publish articles and translations of enduring worth which make real contributions to scholarship and to present tool materials and information which are of value and interest to those engaged in the study of the Far East.
