ROYAL COLLEGE OF SURGEONS OF ENGLAND
LIONEL COLLEGE MEMORIAL FELLOWSHIP
IN OTOLARYNGOLOGY

THE next award or awards of the above Fellowship will be made for the year commencing 1 July 1983. The maximum award to any one Fellow will be £2,500.

The following conditions are laid down by the Trust:

1. Applicants must be United Kingdom born Fellows of the Royal College of Surgeons of England aged between 25 and 35 years at the closing date for receipt of applications who are senior trainees or recently appointed consultants, or of similar status, in otolaryngology.
2. The subject of the award is head and neck surgery with an emphasis on laryngology.
3. The Fellowship is tenable for a period of study or research in the Continent of North America.

Applications for the award or awards for 1982-83 must reach the Deputy Secretary of the Royal College of Surgeons of England, 35/43 Lincoln's Inn Fields, London WC2A 3PN not later than 8 April 1983 and must include the following:

- (a) Name, qualifications and brief curriculum vitae, including present appointment;
- (b) Proposals for the tour or visit to be made during the tenure of the Fellowship;
- (c) Letters of support from the applicant's present consultant (or, if already a consultant, the name of an independent referee in the United Kingdom) and the head(s) of the department(s) to be visited;
- (d) A statement of the expenses to be incurred and of available financial resources.

Short-listed applicants may be required to attend for interview in London, in which case necessary travelling expenses will be reimbursed.

REHABILITATION OF HEARING IMPAIRED ADULTS COMMUNICATION SKILLS

(INCLUDING A VISIT TO GÖTEBORG)

Suitable for medical practitioners, hearing therapists,
audiological scientists, and those in related fields

16-20 MAY 1983

THE course this year will take place on a large, comfortable ferry travelling from Felixstowe to Göteborg (Sweden) and back and will include a visit to Dr. Lidén's world famous Rehabilitation Department in Göteborg.

The lectures and demonstrations will be given by the staff of the Department of Auditory Rehabilitation of the Royal National Throat, Nose and Ear Hospital and Professor David Goldstein of Purdue University, U.S.A.

The course will apply the comprehensive model developed by Goldstein and Stephens to the practice of Audiological Rehabilitation. In this year's course the emphasis will be on the different aspects of the assessment of patients' communication skills and their remediation. It will also include a section on environmental aids and ancillary help.

These different aspects will be integrated into the context of the comprehensive model, and the details and value of the approach will be illustrated by case studies and video-recorded presentations. The aim of the course is to teach the use of the model with resulting improvement in daily practice.

The fee of £130 includes course fees, meals on the ferry, and accommodation in four-berth cabins (single and double berth cabins are available on payment of a supplement). Reservations can be made if required for accompanying friends or relatives. The fee for the trip (in a four-berth cabin), with meals on the ferry but without attendance on the course, will be £70. Participants will be free to make their own arrangements for meals on the day spent in Göteborg.
