Ranging chronologically from the Premonarchic Period, c.1,000 B.C., through the time of David and Solomon up to the second century B.C., each episode is related to the life and thought of the people, exposing their influence on our cultural development.

Dr. Kraeling has expanded Dr. Bewer's work in light of recent archaeological discoveries which have broadened the horizons of Old Testament study and critical viewpoint, notably, the new Aramaic papyri from the fifth century Jewish colony on Elephantine Island in Egypt; the Ras Shamra in Syria; and the epochal Dead Sea Scrolls.

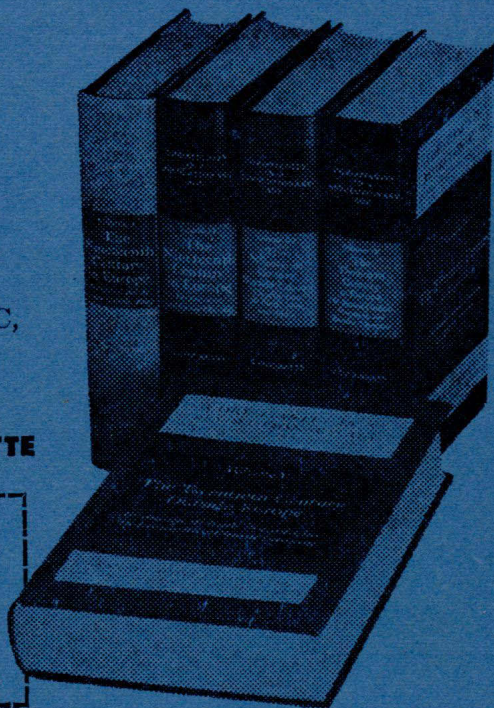
