A Report on the Congressional Fellowship Program, 1984-85 and 1985-86

The Congressional Fellowship Program is a professional level internship that gives academics, journalists, federal executives, and other professionals an opportunity to work on the staffs of senators, representatives, and congressional committees. Its goals are:

- to improve the quality of scholarship and teaching on Congress and American national politics;
- to enhance public understanding of Congress and policymaking; and
- to provide professionals from several fields with practical experience in Congress and insight into the legislative process.

Since 1953, the first year of the Program, there have been a total of 1,166 Fellows, including 209 political scientists, 165 journalists, 561 federal executives, and 232 medical faculty and others.

Although the first class of Fellows had only six members, in recent years the Program has grown to include between 40 and 50 Fellows each year. The political science and journalism Fellows are selected in nationwide competitions. Political scientist applicants must have completed their doctorates within the last ten years or be near completion, and reporters must have a bachelor's degree and between two and ten years of professional experience in newspaper, magazine, television, or radio reporting. Criteria for selection are quality training, demonstrated competence, maturity and responsibility, relevance of fellowship experience to career goals, and potential for professional advancement.

While the political scientists and journalists remain the core of the program and are supported by the APSA through contributions from corporations and foundations, the majority of each year's class of Fellows participate in the program through affiliate arrangements, including:

- federal executives (Grades 13-16) supported by agency training funds;

- Asian Fellows supported by the Asia Foundation;
- Harkness Fellows supported by the Commonwealth Fund;
- Health Policy Fellows, including medical faculty, supported by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation;
- anthropology faculty supported by the American Anthropological Association;
- West German Fellows supported by the German Marshall Fund;
- Carl Albert Fellows supported by the Carl Albert Center at the University of Oklahoma;
- a Chinese Fellow supported by the Ford Foundation; and
- a French Fellow supported by the Fondation Franco-Americaine in Paris.

Financial support for the political scientists and journalists is provided by the Exxon Education Foundation, IBM, Field Enterprises Charitable Corporation, Gannett Foundation, the New York Times Foundation, and the Poynter Fund.

The Walter and Phyllis Shorestein Family has provided funding to endow a Fellowship in the name of their daughter, Joan Shorestein Barone. Joan was a well known and highly respected producer for CBS News who died in 1985 at a tragically early age. The Joan Shorestein Barone Fellowship will be awarded to a broadcast journalist of special merit, and will be given for the first time next year.

The Fellowship Program commences in early November with an orientation period that includes meetings and seminars with members of Congress, congressional staffs, political scientists, journalists, lobbyists, government administrators, and others on a wide range of topics relating to Congress and national politics. During this time Fellows also begin exploring possibilities for assignments in congressional offices. These negotiations are conducted by the Fellows themselves, and their placements are decided by the Fellows and the offices in which they will work.

Fellows begin work in House or Senate offices in early December, and serve in their initial assignments for about four and a half months. In April they are encouraged to look for new assignments in the other House of Congress so that each Fellow has an opportunity to experience both the House and Senate during the Fellowship year. Weekly seminars for the Fellows are held throughout the year to supplement the orientation period, and each

Fellow also makes one trip with a Senator or Representative to the member's home state or district to observe constituent work and campaign activities.

Catherine E. Rudder is Director of the Congressional Fellowship Program, and Nancy McManus is Assistant Director. An Advisory Committee, whose members are listed below, provides overall policy guidance for the Program.
