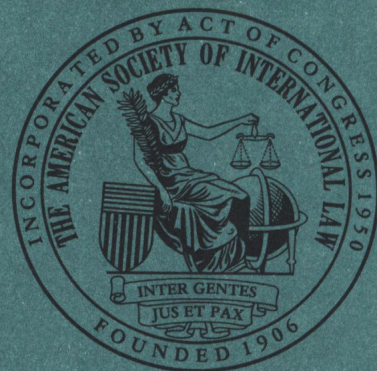

Among the issues left open was the settlement of private property claims arising out of mass relocations of populations since the 1948 war. The authors weigh the comparative merits of repossession, compensation and resettlement assistance, and find that, in general, the most promising way to correct past disentanglements is through rehabilitation rather than repossession of lost property.</p>
