In Washington, DC, SHEA, in collaboration with the Institute for Health Care Improvement, will offer a course entitled "Improving Health Care Through Clinical Epidemiology and Quality Improvement," November 23-25, 1996. This course will address some of the QA/QI techniques that are needed to improve the processes and outcomes of clinical care.

SHEA, in collaboration with the CDC, continues to sponsor biannual training courses in hospital epidemi-

ology. The most recent one was held in San Antonio, October 5-8, 1996. Although heavily emphasizing infection control issues and epidemic investigation, this course also addresses issues of quality improvement. The next hospital epidemiology training course will be held in Atlanta, May 16-21, 1997.

Varicella Immunization in Pregnancy Registry

Hospital epidemiologists are an important source of information regarding inadvertent exposure to live virus vaccines during pregnancy. Although wild-type varicella sometimes has been associated with a pattern of birth defects called congenital varicella syndrome, there are no data that address the risk of varicella vaccine when given in pregnancy. Because healthcare workers so frequently are women of reproductive age, and those who are still susceptible to varicella are candidates for the vaccine, it is possible that vaccination inadvertently may occur during pregnancy.

In collaboration with the CDC, Merck and Co has established a registry to follow the outcomes of pregnancy when vaccination with the varicella vaccine has occurred within 3 months prior to pregnancy or at any time during pregnancy. The purpose of this registry is to obtain information on pregnancy outcomes that may be of use to healthcare providers and to women who are vaccinated during this interval.
