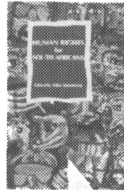
South African Human Rights and Labour Law Yearbook

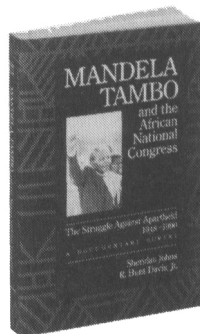

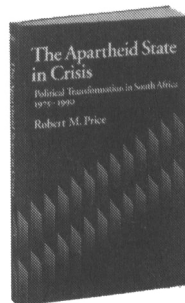

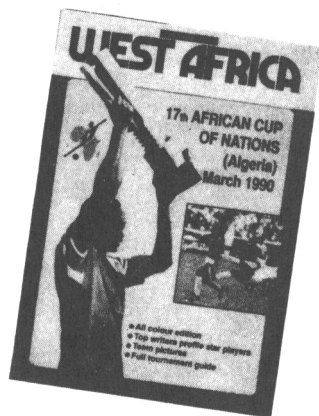
