Applications are invited for the Challis Chair of Philosophy which will become vacant on the resignation of Professor J. L. Mackie to take up his appointment to the Chair of Philosophy in the University of York. There is in the Department of Philosophy another Professor of Philosophy and the two Professors are jointly responsible for the teaching of the subject. Salary will be at the rate of £A4,250 per annum plus cost of living adjustments (at present £A49 p.a.). Academic salaries are at present under review. There is retirement provision under either the Sydney University Professorial Superannuation Scheme or the New South Wales State Superannuation Scheme. Under the Staff Members' Housing Scheme, in cases approved by the University and its Bankers, married men may be assisted by loans to purchase a house. The Senate reserves the right to fill the Chair by invitation.
