The Editors and Editorial Board of The Journal of Ecclesiastical History are delighted to continue to support a major prize in the field of early Christian History.

The *Journal* is offering an annual prize of £500 for the best essay submitted on a subject connected with any aspect of early Christian history, broadly understood as including the first seven centuries AD/CE. Scholars in any relevant discipline (theology, classics, late antique studies, Middle Eastern Studies etc.), whether established in their field or graduate students, are encouraged to enter the competition. The essays should not exceed 8,000 words, including footnotes, and for 2016 should be submitted by 30th September 2015. A judgement will be made at the end of November of the same year (the editors reserve the right not to award the prize if no essay of significant quality is submitted). The essay of the successful candidate will be published in the *Journal*, probably in the number appearing in July 2016. Other submissions entered into the competition may also be recommended for publication. **All essays should be sent as two hard copies, prepared to journal style, to Mrs. Anne Waites, The Journal of Ecclesiastical History, Robinson College, Cambridge CB3 9AN.**

Submission of Articles and Comment

The *Ecclesiastical Law Journal* covers all aspects of ecclesiastical law, with a particular emphasis on the legal regulation of the Church of England and the worldwide Anglican Communion. Its range of coverage also includes comparative studies of the laws of other faiths and of the interface between law and religion in United Kingdom jurisprudence and worldwide. General policy is developed by the Editor in collaboration with the Editorial Board.

The *Ecclesiastical Law Journal* is peer reviewed and operates an anonymous double blind refereeing process using members of the Editorial Board together with others expert in the particular field concerned. Authors should therefore take care not to identify themselves within the text of the manuscript which they submit. Articles should generally be between 5,000 and 7,000 words and Comment pieces should not exceed 2,000 words. All submissions should be made to the Editor.
