CONTRIBUTORS TO THIS ISSUE

JOHN K. GRUENFELDER is Professor of History at the University of Wyoming. He has published a number of articles on elections and electoral patronage in the reigns of James I and Charles I. He is continuing his research into early Stuart Elections and is working on a study of York in that period.

RICHARD HENDRIX works in Washington as Program Officer for the Fund for the Improvement of Post-secondary Education, Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. He has previously taught in the English departments of Williams College and Roosevelt University.

JUDITH J. HURWICH teaches history at the Nightingale-Bamford School in New York City. Her article on "The Social Origins of the Early Quakers" appeared in *Past and Present* (No. 48, 1970). She is presently doing research on the history of women and the family in early modern Europe.

BRYCE LYON is Professor of History at Brown University. His major books include: *From Fief to Indenture* (1957), *Constitutional and Legal History of Medieval England* (1960), *The Origins of the Middle Ages* (1962), *Medieval Finance* (1967), *Henri Pirenne: A Biographical and Intellectual Study* (1974), *The Journal de Guerre of Henri Pirenne* (1976). He has also published numerous articles on medieval history in American, English, and European journals. He is currently preparing an edition of the Wardrobe Book of King Edward III for the years 1338-40.

MICHAEL W. McCAHILL is now Director of Studies at Brooks School, North Andover, Massachusetts. His article, "The Scottish Peerage and the House of Lords," was published in the *Scottish Historical Review* (1972). He is currently working on the eighteenth-century House of Lords.

D. G. PAZ is Lecturer in History at the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor. He is doing research on early Victorian political, social, and administrative history.

MATTHEW R. TEMMEL is Assistant Professor of History at the University of Washington, Seattle. He is working on a study of W. E. Forster and Liberal politics in the 1880s.

LYNNE E. WITHEY is Assistant Professor of History at the University of Iowa. She is completing a comparative study of community development and urbanization in Newport and Providence, Rhode Island, 1638-1800.
