NOTES FOR CONTRIBUTORS

Articles for the *Scottish Journal of Theology* **must** be submitted on disk as well as in hardcopy. Disks may be in 3½ inch IBM or Mac format. Older 3 inch disks are no longer usable.

Prospective authors are asked to send three copies of their article and a disk to Dr Iain Torrance, Department of Divinity, University of Aberdeen, Aberdeen AB9 2UB, Scotland, UK. If they have an e-mail address, it would be helpful if they would include this, and their articles will be acknowledged in that format.

Submission of an article is taken to imply that it has not previously been published in English, and is not being considered by another journal for publication in English. In the interests of authors, copyright is normally assigned to the publisher. **The average length of articles is 5,000 words; those in excess of 10,000 words cannot be considered.**

While notification of acceptance or rejection will be given, rejected contributions (disk and hardcopy) will not be returned. It is assumed that authors retain copies of all articles or reviews submitted.

Authors of book reviews are encouraged to send them by e-mail.

All contributions (articles and reviews) should be submitted in double spacing, with footnotes in single spacing. Cross references within an article should not be included.

Notes for editors and instructions for the printer should be submitted along with the manuscript on separate sheets. First proofs of articles (but not of reviews) will be sent to authors for correction, and must be returned within ten days of receipt. Corrections should be confined to typographical errors. Other corrections may be made only with the concurrence of the editors.

Contributions from North America may use North American spellings. Greek and Hebrew words, which should be used sparingly, need not be transliterated. Capitalisation should be kept to a minimum, and in particular should not be used in pronouns referring to God. The editors reserve the right to make minor alterations in the text in accordance with their established editorial practice.

Contributors of articles and of article reviews (but not of reviews) receive one copy of the journal in which their article appears without charge. Extra copies may be ordered at half price from the publisher.
