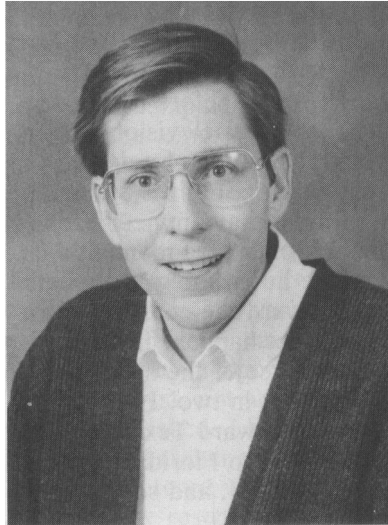

diation efforts by the U.S. Department of Interior to address irrigation-induced water quality problems.

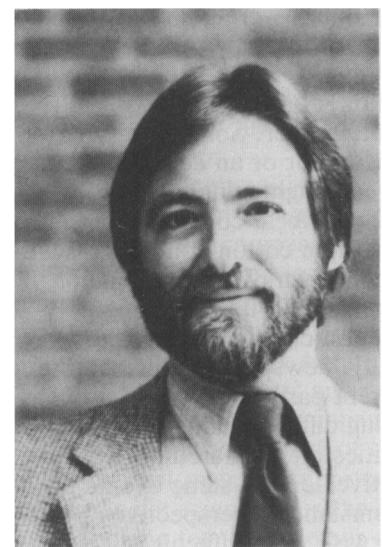
