Early Christianity faced the problem of the human word versus Christ the Word. Could material language accurately describe spiritual reality? *The Mirror of Language* brilliantly traces the development of one prominent theory of signs from Augustine through Anselm of Canterbury, Thomas Aquinas, and Dante. Their shared epistemology drew on Platonism, Stoicism, and Aristotelianism to validate human language as an authentic but limited index of preexistent reality, both material and spiritual. This sign theory could thereby account for the ways people receive, know, and transmit religious knowledge, always mediated through faith.

When first published, in 1968, *The Mirror of Language* was recognized as a pathfinding study. This completely revised edition incorporates the scholarship of the intervening years and reflects the refinements of the author's thought.

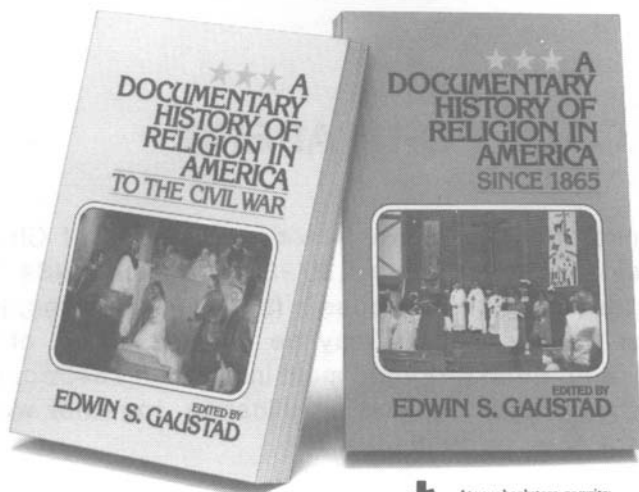

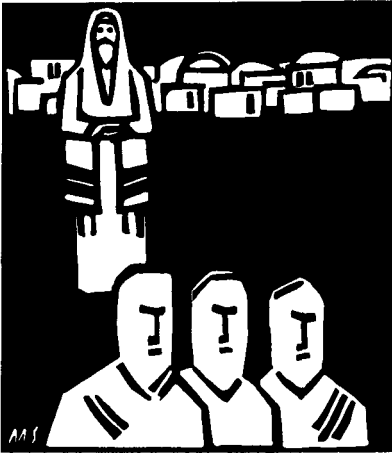

## The Origins of Anti-Semitism

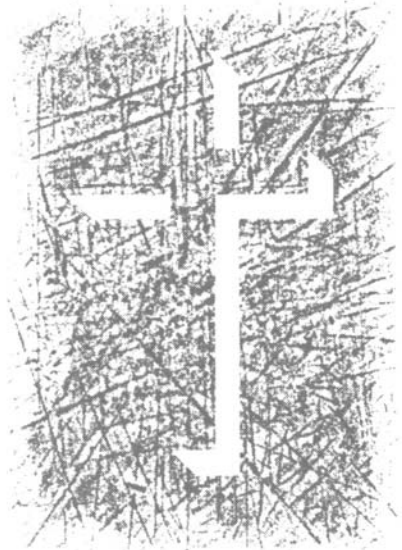
Attitudes toward Judaism in Pagan and Christian Antiquity

JOHN G. GAGER, *Princeton University*

The author asserts that "our sense of the past is created for us largely by history's winners," and the voices of the losers have been lost. On the basis of a reexamination of the original sources and a review of both Christian and Jewish scholarship, Gager retrieves these "lost voices" and finds a wide spectrum of opinion regarding Jews. He concludes that anti-semitism in antiquity was rare. Early Greeks and Romans viewed Judaism as an ancient and respectable philosophy; attitudes ranged from sympathy to participation in some Jewish practices to outright conversion. Indeed an important reason for early Christian antipathy was the fact that Judaism was such a formidable competitor. Gager also shows that among early Christians, there were many who called themselves Jewish and Christian, but the faction that prevailed (along with their writings) repudiated Judaism. Paul—usually cited as the chief advocate of this latter view—is here given a radical reinterpretation, showing him to be totally outside the mainstream of Christian anti-Judaism.
