## *Editorial Policy*

*Central European History* publishes articles, review articles, book reviews and conference reports dealing with the history of German-speaking Central Europe. The journal solicits manuscripts using all approaches to history and dealing with all historical periods. Because space is limited, articles which have been or soon will be published elsewhere are not accepted. Manuscripts submitted to CEH should not be under consideration by another journal pending decision of the editor on publication. If it is learned that an article is under submission to another journal while being considered at CEH, consideration will cease immediately. Unsolicited book reviews are not accepted.

The entire text, including footnotes and headings, of manuscripts submitted for publication must be prepared in double-spaced typescript with generous margins to allow for copyediting. Manuscripts should be submitted in two copies. Footnotes must be numbered consecutively and should be placed in a separate section at the end of the text. It would be very helpful if authors would supply a computer disk with the article in Word Perfect or Word, on either 3 1/2" or 5 1/4" double-sided diskettes.

Further guidelines for the preparation of manuscripts for publication in *Central European History* will be sent upon acceptance of materials by the editor. All materials will be edited to conform with *The Chicago Manual of Style* in matters regarding punctuation, capitalization, and format. The final decision on style remains with the editor.
