

## ABOUT THE AUTHORS

ISAAC D. BALBUS is an Associate Professor of Political Science at the University of Illinois, Chicago Circle, and the author of *The Dialectics of Legal Repression: Black Rebels before the American Criminal Courts*. He is currently working on a critical analysis of language and linguistic theory in advanced capitalist societies.

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JACEK KURCZEWSKI holds M.A. (1965) and Ph.D. (1972) degrees in Sociology from the University of Warsaw, where he is now an Assistant Professor. His books in Polish are *The Legal and Moral Beliefs of Polish Society* (1971), *Models of Law in Social Research* (1977); in 1973 he coauthored *Primitive Law* and in 1975 he edited *Law in Society*. He has also published papers and articles in Russian, Italian, and English and is presently conducting research on dispute settlement.
