THE AMERICAN ACADEMY IN ROME has awarded a Rome Prize Fellowship in the History of Art for 1982–83 to RSA Member Derek Moore (Inst. of Fine Arts, NYU), and a Rome Prize Fellowship in Post-Classical Humanistic Studies for 1982–83 to RSA Member John McManamon, S.J. (U of N. C., Chapel Hill). The academy announces the following 1983–84 fellowships:

Rome Prize Fellowships in the School of Classical Studies: the fields of award are Classical Studies and Archaeology, Post-Classical Humanistic Studies, History of Art, and Modern Italian Studies. The fellowships, offered to citizens of the United States, carry a monthly stipend and travel allowance for one year (pre-doctoral fellowship) or two years (post-doctoral fellowship).

Andrew Mellon Fellowships: a four-year program of post-doctoral fellowships in the humanities funded by the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation. Beginning in September 1983, one fellowship a year will be available in each of the following fields: Classical Studies, Art History, and Medieval or Renaissance Studies. Applicants must hold the Ph.D. and also, at the time of appointment, must either hold the position of assistant professor or have been appointed associate professor within the previous two years.

VILLA I TATTI: THE HARVARD CENTER FOR ITALIAN RENAIS-SANCE STUDIES will award upward of ten stipendiary fellowships for independent study for the academic year 1983–84. I Tatti offers fellowships for scholars of any nationality, normally post-doctoral and in the earlier stages of their careers. Stipends will be granted according to individual need and availability of funds with a maximum of \$22,000. Fellows must devote full time to study. Applicants should send their *curriculum vitae* and a description of their projects to the Director, Harvard Center for Italian Renaissance Studies, Villa I Tatti, Via di Vincigliata 26, 50135 Florence, Italy, with duplicates to Walter Kaiser, 401 Boylston Hall, Harvard University, Cambridge, Massachusetts 02138.
