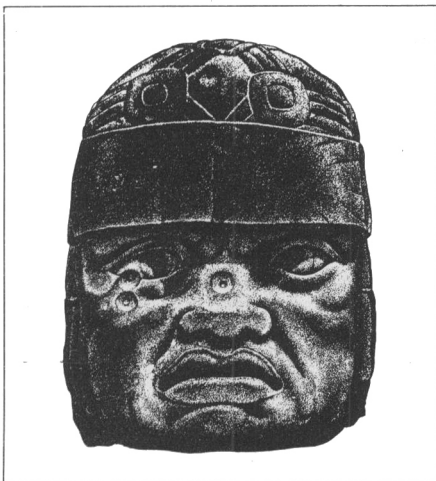


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The first volume of the SAA Papers Series, *Models and Methods in Regional Exchange*, edited by Robert E. Fry, is about to go to press. Proposals for the second volume in the series are now being solicited by the Society's Special Publications Committee.

It is planned that each volume will consist of a collection of papers concerned with a significant thematic topic. It is expected that all papers will address a common theoretical or methodological theme, and that they will be useful to a broad spectrum of the profession. Each volume will be produced under the direction of a volume editor. Collections concentrating on a restricted geographic region or time frame will be acceptable given that their orientation and interpretive framework are useful to a wider audience than just specialists in that region. Special consideration will be given to those proposals that might not have great appeal to commercial publishers.

The Special Publications Committee, which selects the volumes, consists of Steven LeBlanc (University of New Mexico), Chair; Christopher Peebles (University of Michigan); Polly Bickel (San Francisco State University); and Jeremy Sabloff (University of New Mexico), *ex officio*. The committee is currently accepting volume proposals for the second volume. The deadline for proposals is February 1, 1980. *Proposals or questions about the series should be sent to Dr. Steven LeBlanc, Department of Anthropology, University of New Mexico, Albuquerque, New Mexico 87131.*

A proposal should consist of (1) a short (4–5 page) justification for the volume topic by the proposed editor, analogous to the volume preface; and (2) 500-word abstracts for the papers to be included in the proposed volume (completed papers are welcome, but not required). If a synthesis or paper commentaries are planned, justification of who would write these should be included.

As the choice of volumes is, by necessity, conditioned by the capabilities of the volume editor, the committee would like a vita or other supporting documentation of his or her ability to function in this capacity.

We are aware that meeting symposia will often provide the basis for a volume proposal and we are most interested in receiving proposals resulting from symposia. However, we urge prospective editors to inform symposia participants that symposia papers, in their original forms, are generally not acceptable as volume papers. We expect volume papers to be more substantive and comprehensive than what can be presented in the short time slots of symposia. We suggest that potential editors discuss this consideration with symposia participants and make sure they realize that substantive re-working of symposia papers would be required for publication.
