Known for his portraits of radical figures and social experiments, Glaswegian artist Luke Fowler was one of the nominees for the Turner Prize 2012 for his film *All Divided Selves* about RD Laing. Based on original archive footage, interleaved with Fowler's own film and sound, the piece is a collage of material from different stages of Laing's life and work. The editing of footage from a variety of contexts results in a narrative discontinuity that merges public appearances and television interviews together with moments of everyday clinical work. Previous examples of Fowler's biographical and documentary filmmaking have often focused on psychiatry or anti-psychiatry. *What You See Is Where You're At* (2001) described Kingsley Hall, a community centre in east London, founded in the 1960s by RD Laing and the Philadelphia Association as an alternative to conventional mental institutions. In a subsequent installation, *The Nine Monads of David Bell* (2006), the artist focused on David Bell, one of the residents at Kingsley Hall, with an installation that included a sound piece from original recordings of David Bell's speech, notes he wrote on newspaper and video reenactments of his dreams.
