NOTES ON CONTRIBUTORS

PATRICIA CRAWFORD is a Lecturer in History at the University of Western Australia. She has published "The Savile Affair" in the *English Historical Review* (Jan., 1975), and is presently writing a political biography of Denzil Holles (1598-1680).

DONALD LAMMERS is Associate Professor at Michigan State University, where he teaches courses in Modern European and British History. He is currently studying the effects of decolonization on British society and culture after the Second World War.

ROGER B. MANNING is Professor of History and Chairman of the History Department at Cleveland State University. He has published *Religion and Society in Elizabethan Sussex* and numerous articles in American and English journals. He is currently researching and writing a series of articles on riots, sedition, and various forms of social protest in Tudor and early Stuart England.

MICHAEL J. MOORE is Associate Professor of History at Appalachian State University, Boone, North Carolina, and has been editor of *Albion* since 1973. His articles on philanthropy and social welfare have previously appeared in *Albion* and *Social Service*. He is working on the relationship between police and public protest in Britain from 1885 to 1914.

GREGORY D. PHILLIPS is a Teaching and Research Fellow at Stanford University having received his Ph. D. from Harvard in June, 1976. He has recently completed revising his dissertation on the Diehards, and is now working on voting patterns in the House of Lords from 1886 to 1893.

F. K. PROCHASKA has been a Visiting Assistant Professor at the University of Missouri-Columbia and a Visiting Lecturer at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He has published articles in the *Journal of the History of Ideas*, the *International Review of Social History*, and *J.B.S.* He lives in London and is continuing to study the role of women in nineteenth-century philanthropy.

TIMOTHY J. RUNYAN is Associate Professor of History and Assistant Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at Cleveland State University. He has published articles in *Medieval Studies*, *Mariner's Mirror*, and the *American Journal of Legal History*. He is currently preparing an edition of late medieval maritime documents for the Navy Records Society (England).

JOSEPH WHITE is Associate Professor of History at the University of Pittsburgh. His book, *The Limits of Trade Union Militancy*, a study of the Lancashire textile workers during the 1910-14 labor unrest, will be published late in 1977. He is currently studying British working class culture during the 1920s and 1930s.
