Membership and Subscription


The Society's Byelaws set out the membership requirements as follows:

1. Anyone wishing to become a Fellow must be nominated by a Fellow of the Society and a seconder, each acting on personal knowledge that the candidate is likely to be a suitable and useful Fellow. The nominating Fellow and the seconder shall address the Secretary in writing and give the candidate's name, status, occupation and address.
2. A candidate for Fellowship may, instead of being nominated by a Fellow of the Society, address an application in writing to the Secretary giving the required information above and supported by a letter of recommendation from his head of department or supervisor or other responsible person who need not be a Fellow of the Society.
3. It shall be within the power of the Council, on being satisfied as to the credentials of any particular candidate in exceptional circumstances, to dispense with these conditions.

5. The first payment of subscription is due on election, but if a candidate is elected in November or December of any year, the first annual subscription shall cover the year beginning 1st January next after his election.

Thomas Manning

Thomas Manning was a mathematician and one of Britain's first Sinologists. He was the first Englishman to meet the Dalai Lama, visited Napoleon in St Helena, and corresponded with the likes of Charles Lamb (1775-1834), Sir Joseph Banks (1743-1820) and Charles Lloyd (1775-1839). His archive contains journals of his varied travels in Europe and Asia, linguistic notes (including Chinese jokes), poems, and personal letters.

In January 2018, the Society launched a Digital Library to showcase some of the treasures and highlights from its collections. These are now available to a worldwide audience, absolutely free, here: <http://royalasiaticcollections.org/>

The Digital Library already includes dozens of complete manuscripts, archives, paintings, and drawings, including:

- Several exquisite Persian manuscripts, such as the Shahnamah of Muhammad Juki (RAS Persian 239), the Gulistan of the poet Sa'di (RAS Persian 258) and an autograph copy of the Masnavi of Zafar Khan (RAS Persian 310)
- Several dozen Malay manuscripts from the Raffles, Maxwell, and Farquhar collections, including RAS Raffles Malay 18: the Sejarah Melayu (Malay Annals)
- The digitized archive of Thomas Manning (1772-1840), Sinologist, mathematician, and explorer
- Much, much more!

If non-Roman scripts or characters are used, these should be rendered in Unicode. We strongly discourage submission of articles formatted in ‘TeX’ or in hardcopy. Occasionally authors may wish to send CDs or USB-sticks to the editorial office by post.
