
TELEVISION AND CHILDREN

SCHOOL COMMISSION PROGRAM

During 1977 the Commonwealth Government grants totalling \$1,093 million will be available for projects in the States in order to enrich and support the education of children living in Institutions.

Institutions are encouraged to make joint approaches and could include programs such as tutoring, excursions, library programs, educational services, resources for developing social competency, consultancy or conduct of workshops to help personnel in institutions develop programs.

Further information may be obtained from the "Children in Residential Settings Committee", which will be located in the department responsible for education in each State.

CHILDREN IN HOSPITAL CONFERENCE

The Association for the welfare of children in Hospital has received more than 500 enquiries from intending delegates to the Association's National Conference to be held at the University of Sydney from the 26th-29th May, 1977.

The Conference will focus on the theme, "The Emotional Needs of Infants and Young Children — Implications for Policy and Practice."

The Conference will be led by James and Joyce Robertson, world-renowned authors and researchers in child welfare who now head up the Robertson Centre an educational trust to provide understanding of the emotional needs of infants and young children.

Australian speakers include Marie Coleman, Director of the Office of Child Care, Department of Social Security; Spencer Colliver, First Assistant to Director General, Social Welfare Division, Department of Social Security; Ms. Anne Deveson, Commissioner, Royal Commission on Human Relationships; and Mr. Al. Jean Vanier is the founder of a movement in France known as L'Arche and in North America as Daybreak.
