The Journal will consider for publication original papers concerning research, education, planning, and delivery of emergency and critical care medicine, with emphasis on their relevance for disaster situations.

Manuscripts

Manuscripts should be typed double spaced throughout, including footnotes, references, and figure legends, on one side of 81/2" x 11" paper. An original and two clear copies should be submitted. Manuscripts should be clearly written and, where appropriate, include abstract, introduction, methods, results, discussion, conclusions, and references. Footnotes should be included, where applicable. Tables should be numbered and cited in the text. All manuscripts must be typed in English. The title page should include the title of the contribution; the author(s) name(s), highest degrees, departments, and institutions; the name of the organization and date of the meeting if the paper has been presented; and the name, address, and telephone number of the author responsible for correspondence concerning the manuscript. Suggested length of manuscript is six to eight pages.

Originality

All manuscripts submitted should not be under consideration by another journal. Accepted manuscripts may not be published elsewhere without the written permission of the editor. Any material previously published must be accompanied by written consent from all authors and publisher. Research on human subjects should include a statement indicating approval by the institution's human research committee.

Illustrations

Line drawings and/or photographs should be suitable for black-and-white reproduction, i.e. glossy camera-ready reproductions. Tables and figures should be cited in the text. Legends to figures should be typed on separate sheets. The article title, author, figure number, and top should be shown on the back of each figure. X-rays should be highcontrast glossy prints with black areas of print corresponding to black areas on original negatives. Illustrations appearing in other publications require reprint permission from the author and publisher.

References

References should be cited in the text, using the same number every time the reference appears. References should be listed separately under the heading "references" at the end of the paper; for research papers in numbered consecutive sequence as they appear in the text; and for review papers, in alphabetic sequence. List up to three authors; if more, "et al". Use Index Medicus style.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The 5th World Congress will be held at the Sheraton Hotel in Rio on May 13th - 16th, 1987 in succession to previous congresses on Emergency and Disaster Medicine in Mainz in the 1970's, in Pittsburgh in 1979 and in 1981, in Rome in 1983 and in Brighton in 1985.

Rio's 1987 World Congress will cover important medical and general health care subjects in the field of Emergency and Disaster Medicine from around the world.

Participation in the Congress by international organizations dealing with various aspects of Emergency and Disaster Medicine has been confirmed. Physicians, nurses, paramedical personnel, administrators and allied specialists in various fields will participate in the meeting.

Objectives

- Daily meetings among participants from diverse backgrounds will offer an opportunity to initiate, update and exchange ideas.
- The identification of common problems associated with disaster and practical guidelines for more efficient control of emergency and disaster situations.
- A discussion of the possibility of using information centers which would be permanently available for consultation during disaster situations.
- A consideration of the best methods of disseminating the "information" which is constantly being generated and its incorporation into teaching, training and management objectives.
- An attempt to categorize particular aspects of emergency disaster events which may have common solutions worldwide.
- Proposals concerning future congresses and meetings to encourage co-ordination of proposals and results so as to avoid conflicts of topics and dates.

Continuing Education Credits

The Congress qualifies for 21 hours of continuing Medical Education Credits. Application for CME Credits has been submitted.

SCIENTIFIC PROGRAM

Contributions are invited for the Scientific Program. A Scientific Abstract form should be completed and submitted to the Congress Secretary before *January 31st*, 1987. Verbal presentations should be no longer than 15 minutes. Poster and videofilm presentations will be accepted.

- 12. The Relationship of the Traditional Medical Specialties with Emergency and Disaster Medicine.
