THE CONTRIBUTORS

GABRIEL A. ALMOND is Professor of Public and International Affairs and Research Associate in the Center of International Studies at Princeton University. The author of *The American People and Foreign Policy* (1950) and *The Appeals of Communism* (1954), he serves as an advisory editor of *World Politics*.

KENT GEIGER is Assistant Professor of Sociology at Tufts University and a member of the Russian Research Center at Harvard. He has written several articles on Soviet society and is now preparing a book of readings on Soviet social institutions.

JACK HIRSHLEIFER, Assistant Professor in the School of Business at the University of Chicago, also acts as a consultant to the RAND Corporation. He has recently published two articles dealing with the problem of war damage insurance.

REAR ADMIRAL SIR ANTHONY W. BUZZARD, Bart., C.B., D.S.O., O.B.E., who retired from the Royal Navy in 1954, was a member of the British strategic joint planning staff during World War II and served as Director of Naval Intelligence in London from 1951 to 1954.

ERNST B. HAAS, Assistant Professor of Political Science at the University of California (Berkeley), is currently engaged in a study of the European Coal and Steel Community under a Social Science Research Council grant. With Allan S. Whiting, he published *Dynamics of International Relations* in 1955.

HENRY A. KISSINGER, the editor of *Confluence*, a quarterly published by Harvard University, is Executive Director of the Harvard International Seminar and Study Director of a study group on Nuclear Weapons and Foreign Policy at the Council on Foreign Relations. His book, *Peace, Legitimacy and the Equilibrium: The Nature of Conservative Statesmanship*, will appear in the late spring of this year.

HERBERT McCLOSKEY is Associate Professor of Political Science at the University of Minnesota and author, with John Turner, of the forthcoming *The Soviet Dictatorship*. Currently a Fellow at the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences in Stanford, he is preparing for publication the findings of several extensive field studies on the social-psychology of political participation.

FRANZ MICHAEL is Professor of Chinese History and Government and Assistant Director of the Far Eastern and Russian Institute at the University of Washington. He is engaged in writing a book on the modern history of the Far East with George Turner, as well as one entitled *Regional Forces and the Decline of China's Last Dynastic Government*.
