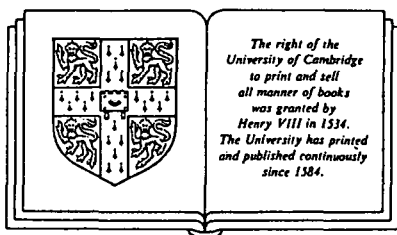

It is published twice yearly, in June and December.

The June 1988 issue will have three special articles to mark the Australian Bicentennial: Alan Gilbert and Hugh Jackson on religion in Australian history and Stuart Piggin on Australian evangelicalism. It will also include regular articles on medieval and modern topics.

The December 1988 issue will mark the retirement of the founding editor, Bruce Mansfield. Articles on ancient, medieval and modern topics will include R. W. Scribner on popular piety in the German Reformation, Marjorie O'Rourke Boyle on Erasmus and More, and Patrick O'Farrell on religion in Australian culture.
