He is the author of numerous articles and is currently working on a book about politics and the poverty lawyer. His major teaching and research interests are in the areas of administrative law and law in the poverty area.

ROBERT J. LEVY is a Professor of Law at the University of Minnesota. He is also the Reporter on Uniform Marriage and Divorce Law for the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws. He has published articles in various legal journals and is one of the authors of a case book on family law. His areas of academic and research interests include family law and social welfare law.

THEODORE B. PEDELISKI is Assistant Professor of Political Science at the University of North Dakota at Grand Forks.
