## HEALTH, MIGRATION AND RETURN A Handbook for a Multidisciplinary Approach Edited by Peter J. van Krieken

What can and should be done if a rejectee or an illegal alien claims to suffer from a serious illness which can only be treated in the country where a residence permit has been sought and/or refused? Should health be considered and accepted as a ground for granting an alien access to a specific country and its health services?

A debate concerning these and other health, migration and return issues is much needed as answers to the challenging questions involved should be formulated. Various disciplines should take an active role in the discussion as fences need to be taken down: the legal experts and migration lawyers need to know the medical and societal implications, the ethics involved have to be clarified, the role played by the North-South relationship has to be determined and, finally, medical staff need to be informed of the human rights issues at stake. This Handbook, with contributions by experts from WHO, IOM and academia, contains a wealth of relevant background documents, including an overview of praxis and of

Strasbourg case-law. It offers a complete overview of theories from various disciplines. It will serve as a basis for a wider debate, covering: the right to health, medical norm-setting, ethics, the right to migration, the duty to return, health and migration, Strasbourg case law, the need for information and harmonization.

Health, Migration and Return analyses the intricate relationship from a variety of perspectives. It will provide important tools to the legal and medical professions and will also become an indispensible source for policy makers, the executive, the media, students and all others interested in issues of migration.

The editor of Health Migration and Return, Dr. Peter van Krieken, is also the editor of Refugee Law in Context: The Exclusion Clause and The Asylum Acquis Handbook, which were recently published by T.M.C. ASSER PRESS.

### CONTENTS OF THE NILR

The NILR invites the submission of articles on legal questions, legal developments, commentaries, analysis and comprehensive overviews in the fields of public international law, private international law and comparative law. These articles must be original and may be of any length up to a maximum of around 35 printed pages each of approximately 450 words. Shorter articles and commentaries of between 5 and 10 printed pages are also published.

The NILR also publishes book reviews and reports of Dutch judicial decisions involving questions of private international law. These have a maximum length of 5 and 15 printed pages, respectively.

The NILR is an English-language publication.

### SUBMISSION OF MATERIAL

Authors are requested to send three copies of each manuscript to the Secretariat: P.O.Box 30461, 2500 GL The Hague, The Netherlands. All submitted material should be in English and should be typed using a personal computer (preferably using WordPerfect). Material may be submitted at any time of the year and, if accepted for publication, will be published at the earliest available opportunity.

### **FEES**

Authors will not receive a fee, but will be presented with the issue of the NILR in which their contribution appears, together with 25 off-prints of their work in the case of articles and case reports and 5 off-prints in the case of book reviews. Additional off-prints may be ordered, upon payment of a standard fee.

### COPYRIGHT

Copyright is exclusively vested in the NILR and the author(s) jointly. Acceptance of the Board of Editors' offer to publish implies, however, that authors agree to an embargo on publication elsewhere, either in English or another language, for a period of two years following the date of publication in the NILR.
