**Short Courses Offered at Annual Meeting**

The Law and Courts, Politics and Life Sciences, and History and Politics organized sections offered the following short courses at the Annual Meeting this summer respectively:

Public Law: The State of the Field, led by John Brigham, University of Massachusetts; Greg Caldeira, Ohio State University; and Leslie Goldstein, University of Delaware;  
Genetics and Public Policy, led by Andrea Bonnicksen, Northern Illinois University, and Robert H. The Association continued its successful Leading Scholar Series for Graduate Students, featuring Theodore J. Lowi, Cornell University. In addition, The Graduate School of Political Management at George Washington University, helped to sponsor Ethics in American Politics, led by Gregory G. Lebel, George Washington University.

**APSA's Bunche Students Attend Annual Meeting**

Eleven of the 25 students participating in the Ralph Bunche Summer Institute came to Chicago to attend APSA's Annual Meeting. The students were recognized at the reception given by the Committee on the Status of Blacks in the Profession.

The Bunche Institute is hosted by a consortium of five Atlanta institutions: Spelman College, Emory University, Morehouse College, Clark Atlanta University and Georgia State University. Each year 25 outstanding African American undergraduates are selected to attend the six-week program whose purpose is to encourage enrollment in graduate school. This year students from 16 states attended the Bunche Institute. Eight of the 25 participants hailed from historically black colleges.

Students enroll in two courses, one in American politics and one in methodology. This summer the courses were taught by Jeanne Meadows of Spelman and Alan Abramowitz of Emory. The Institute is directed by Lois Moreland of Spelman College and is sustained by the volunteer efforts of Tobe Johnson of Morehouse, William Boone of Clark Atlanta, William Thomas of Georgia State, and Eleanor Main and Micheal Giles of Emory. In addition, many

prominent political scientists give their time as guest lecturers, and over 40 graduate programs sent representatives to Atlanta to recruit the students for graduate school.

Funding for the Bunche Institute is generously provided by the Coca-Cola Foundation, the U.S. Department of Education, the Ford Foundation, the Graduate School of Emory University, and Georgia State University.

## Section News

### Council Approves New Sections on Politics and Literature and on Internships

Two new organized sections were approved by the APSA Council at the 1992 Annual Meeting. The first is a section on Internships and Experiential Education to promote and to improve the quality of use of experienced-based techniques in teaching political science including academic internships, cooperative education, service learning, international education, and simulations. The organizers of the section are William D. Muller, SUNY-Fredonia; Gene Alpert, Texas Christian University; John Berg, Suffolk University; and Helen Graves, University of Michigan, Dearborn. Dues are set at \$5.

The other section approved is titled Politics and Literature and addresses the varied relations between politics and literature, including the history of political thought, literature as propaganda, literature as ideological expression, and the political sociology of literature. The section has been organized by Catherine Zuckert of Carleton College, following initial planning by Lyman Tower Sargent, University of Missouri-St. Louis. Dues are \$5.

### Two Sections Adopt New Names

Computers and Multimedia is the new name for what was formerly the Computer Users Section. This change reflects members' interests in the application of a wide variety of technologies in teaching and research.

The former Law, Courts, and Judicial Process section has condensed its name to Law and Courts.

### History and Politics Section Establishes New Award

Two new annual History and Politics Awards have been created by the Section, to be first given at the 1993 APSA Annual Meeting. The first is the "J. David Greenstone Award for an Outstanding Book in History and Politics." Books published in the two years prior to the meeting will be considered, though next year books published in 1990 are eligible. The second award is the "History and Politics Section Award for an Outstanding Published Article or Essay," for articles published in the two years prior to the meeting. Nominations must come from section members, and selection will be made by a committee designated by the section president. Ira Katznelson has been elected Section president for 1992-93.

### Faculty Attend Annual Meeting Seminar on Japan: A Comparative Perspective

The APSA organized a seminar devoted to enhancing teaching about Japanese politics which met September 2-4, 1992, during the APSA's Annual Meeting in Chicago. The seminar was supported by a grant from the Japan-United States Friendship Commission which also supported a seminar on this subject in conjunction with the 1990 Annual Meeting. Kent E. Calder, Princeton University, directed this seminar as he had the 1990 seminar. He will prepare an essay on the seminar's objectives along with a reading list which will be published in a 1993 issue of *PS: Political Science & Politics*. Takeshi Sasaki, University of Tokyo, was a guest speaker at the seminar. Richard Lehne, an alumnus of the 1990 seminar, spoke about the strategies for incorporating coverage of Japan in political science courses.
