THE CONTRIBUTORS

GUY J. PAUKER is Assistant Professor of Political Science and Chairman of the Committee on Southeast Asia Studies at the University of California in Berkeley and a consultant of The RAND Corporation. He is currently engaged in a study of *The Role of the Military in Indonesian Politics* and is writing a volume on *Indonesians' Images of Their National Self*.

STANLEY H. HOFFMANN is Assistant Professor of Government at Harvard University. He is the author of *Organisations Internationales et Pouvoirs Politiques des Etats* (1954) and *Le Mouvement Poujade* (1956) and a contributor to *France Defeats EDC*, edited by Raymond Aron and Daniel Lerner (1957), and *Area and Power*, edited by Arthur Maass (1959).

STANLEY J. ZYZNIEWSKI, Assistant Professor of History and Research Associate in the Department of Foreign Affairs at the University of Virginia, is making a study of economic integration within the Soviet bloc. He recently returned from Warsaw University where, under the auspices of the Ford Foundation, he worked on a historical study of *Alexander II and the Polish Question*.

MARVER H. BERNSTEIN is Professor of Politics at Princeton University and Associate Staff Director of the Special Committee on the Federal Conflict-of-Interest Laws, of the Association of the Bar of the City of New York. His recent publications include *The Politics of Israel* (1957) and *The Job of the Federal Executive* (1958).

JAMES E. KING, JR., is a Research Associate of the Washington Center of Foreign Policy Research, where his principal work in progress is a study of the impact of nuclear weapons upon the defense and promotion of national interests. He is co-author of *Alliance Policy in the Cold War*, to be published in June 1959.

EDGAR H. SCHEIN is Assistant Professor of Psychology in the School of Industrial Management and a Staff Member of the Center for International Studies at M.I.T. For the past five years he has been working on the psychological aspects of Chinese Communist treatment of prisoners of war and political prisoners, and is preparing a book on the psychology of thought reform in the political prison.

WILLIAM WARTZ is Research Associate of the American Geographical Society in New York, and of the Department of Astronomy at Princeton University. The author of *Toward a Geography of Price*, to be published this spring, he is now making a macro-geographic examination of the growth and expansion of the population of the United States.

JOSEPH C. MCKENNA, S.J., is Assistant Professor of International Relations at Fordham University. His chief research interest is the implementation of foreign policy.

FIRUZ KAZEMZADEH, Assistant Professor of History at Yale University, contributed to *The Middle East in Transition*, edited by W. Z. Laqueur (1958). He is at work on a book dealing with the rivalry of Russia and England in Iran from 1860 to 1915.

HEINZ HARTMANN is Assistant Professor in the Department of Economics and Sociology and Research Associate in the Industrial Relations Section at Princeton University. The author of *Education for Business Leadership* (1955) and the forthcoming *Authority and Organization in German Management*, he is engaged in research on the export of business techniques, organizational forms, and philosophies by American corporations with overseas operations.
