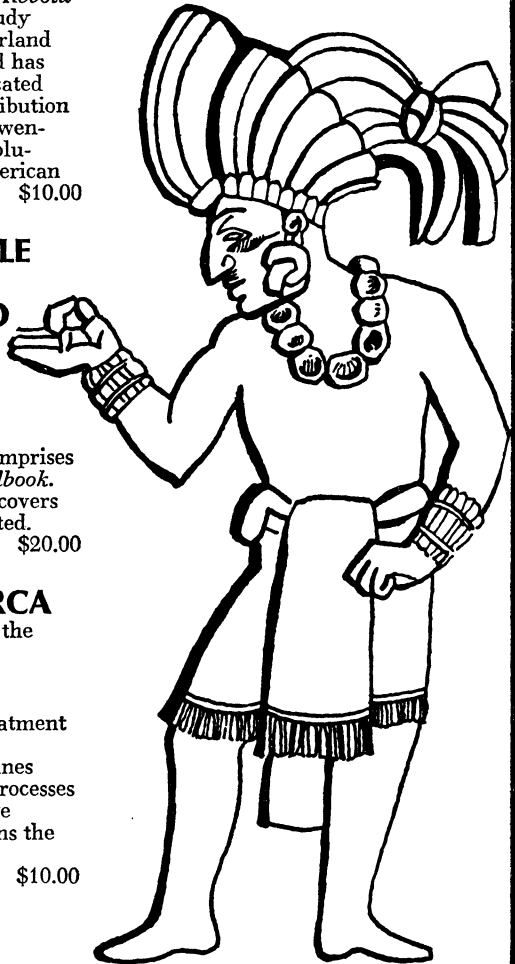

Sugar Without Slaves

The Political Economy of British Guiana, 1838–1904

by Alan H. Adamson

Sugar Without Slaves is a study of the wide range of problems confronting a multi-racial, multicultural, one-crop British colony in the post-emancipation nineteenth century. Its principal themes have to do with the survival of sugar as the dominant crop, of the plantation economy as the dominant system of production, and of the sugar planters as the dominant social and political group. Most of the data are from primary sources and the evidence is new and voluminous. Historians and social scientists alike will find here fascinating insights into the complex network of social and economic relations that developed in this Caribbean country a century ago and have a clear bearing on the tensions besetting Guyanese society today. \$12.50

SOCIETY, SCHOOLS AND PROGRESS IN PERU

This multi-disciplinary study examines the changing functions of Peruvian schools and universities and the role of foreign educational intervention as Peru has sought to break with its colonial heritage.

A stratification model is developed to explain how the present hierarchical educational structure both reflects and tends to perpetuate the rigid social structure of blancos, mestizos, cholos, and Indians. Recent efforts to radically innovate new educational programs in schools, factories, and communities as a means of individual and national renewal are critically analyzed and appraised.

This exceptional volume will be of great interest to students and professionals concerned with social, economic, political, and cultural perspectives on problems of institutional development in Latin America.
