André Gide’s lifelong fascination with the conventions of society led naturally to a strong interest in France’s judicial system. Gide’s obsession with crime and punishment struck at the heart of his themes as a writer. In the tradition of Dostoyevsky and Conrad, Gide frequently used criminals as central characters to explore human nature and the individual’s place in society.
