National Election Studies Reports on 1987 Agenda

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Even before the completion of data collection for the 1986 national election study, the National Election Studies (NES) board and staff have begun serious planning for the next major effort in 1988. Both the May board meeting in Berkeley and the October meeting in Ann Arbor contributed to further development of plans for the 1988 study. As was true in years past, the new planning activities will involve a large number of research scholars who responded to announcements widely distributed in January of the past year.

The first item on the NES calendar for 1987 was a conference on the role of group memberships and affiliations in American national politics. Conference participants were chosen by the board at its October meeting. The conference was held at the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences on January 16 and 17. Morris Fiorina, Harvard University, and Donald Kinder, University of Michigan, will chair the conference.

Later in January, two conferences relevant to the 1988 study were held at the University of California, Berkeley. On January 28 and 29, the NES Standing Committee on Congressional Elections Research met, composed of professors Brody, Fenno, Ferejohn, Goldenberg, Mann, Rivers, Rosenstone, Shanks and Wolfinger. Under the chairmanship of Gary Jacobson, the committee met to consider proposals for a study of Senate and House elections. That meeting was followed by a conference on presidential nominations, also hosted by the Berkeley
