Not the Conference Group for Central European History met in conjunction with the American Historical Association on December 29, 1974, in Chicago. The morning academic session on "Military Service and Nobility: Central European Models," chaired by Harold Deutsch, included papers by Thomas M. Barker (SUNY, Albany) on "Nobility and Proprietary Colonelcies in Austria, 1618-1740"; Gunther Rothenberg (Purdue) on "Nobility and Military Careers: The Habsburg Officer Corps, 1740-1914"; and Holger Herwig (Vanderbilt) on "Feudalization of the Bourgeoisie: The Role of the Nobility in the German Naval Officer Corps, 1898-1918." Robert Kann (Rutgers) commented. At the evening business meeting, with retiring chairman Harold Deutsch presiding, Keith Bird (University of Bridgeport) discussed "The Use of Film in Teaching German History." Dietrich Gerhard (Washington University, Saint Louis) took office as Chairman for 1975; Theodore Hamerow (Wisconsin) was elected Vice-Chairman, Gerald Feldman (University of California, Berkeley) Secretary-Treasurer, and Klemens von Klemperer (Smith College) Member-at-Large of the Executive Committee. The prize given by the Conference Group every two years for the best article published by a North American scholar in the field of Central European history was awarded to Carl E. Schorske (Princeton) for his article "Politics and Patricide in Freud's Interpretation of Dreams," American Historical Review, April 1973.
