A few of you have requested that specific books listed in the <u>MESA Newsletter</u> under books received be sent to you. In almost every case, the books have been assigned by the time the <u>Newsletter</u> reaches you and thus we cannot fulfill your requests.

The putting together of each <u>Bulletin</u> takes a lot of time and energy, and we have always been able to meet Cambridge University Press deadlines because of the outstanding work of Theo MacKay. With the use of word processors we are able to spread the work over a longer period of time, reducing the last minute rush, but still being able to rearrange the articles, book reviews, and news of members in the form we want. Key to all of this has been the work of Jordis Young, and we wish to thank her. To turn the computer file into a printed page in which two types of script are used may seem easy, but it has been fraught with problems, and we are very fortunate that Doris Ringer has made her expertise available in order to reduce if not eliminate these problems. The Mesa Bulletin is the product of many hands; it can improve and be even more helpful to the profession by your imput.
