Comparative Studies in Society and History articles fall into series, each contributor to a series handling its subject in a different context or from a different point of view. The following notes are for the convenience of readers who may wish to see what has appeared in earlier issues on problems discussed in this one.

This whole issue is given over to analyses of two problems that have been a major concern of *CSSH* from the start, the problem of the role of tradition in social change, and of opposition to change. On the first of these, readers are referred to the book by Edward Shils, *The Intellectual between Tradition and Modernity: The Indian Situation*, originally published as Supplement I of the journal, and now republished by Harper & Row, and also to the article by Reinhard Bendix in Vol. 9 of *CSSH*, 'Tradition and Modernity Reconsidered'. On opposition to change, readers may refer to the special issue on *Cultural Innovation* (Vol. 11, No. 4), and to two papers in Vol. 12, No. 1, dealing specifically with tradition and change.
