

THE ENVIRONMENT AND REPRODUCTION IN MAMMALS AND BIRDS

This book comprises some fifty contributions from physiologists, ecologists, behaviourists and conservationists, dealing with the various ways in which the reproductive activity of birds and mammals is influenced or modified by environmental factors. The subject is considered from three standpoints: control of onset of breeding by seasonal changes in daylength, temperature or rainfall, the response of animal communities to local environmental changes, and the consequences of man's activities on wild animal populations.

The theme was chosen not only for its topicality at a time when pollution, crowding and predation are of wide concern, but also because the past few years have seen remarkable advances in environmental studies.

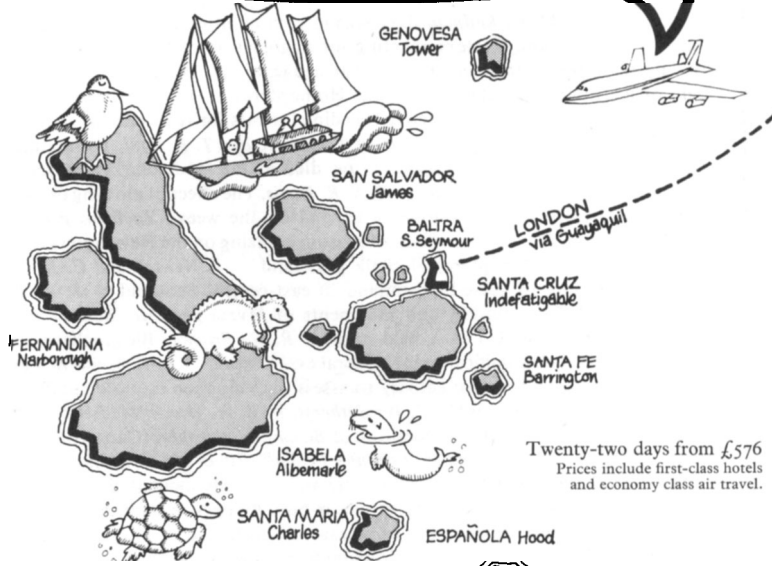
