Buğra Ayşe is Professor of Economics at Boğaziçi University. She specializes in development economics, history and methodology of economic thought, and comparative economic systems. Author of *Business in Modern Turkey* (SUNY Press 1994) and the co-editor of *State, market and Organizational Forms* (Walter de Gruyter, 1997). Has publications in *Current Anthropology*, *International Journal of Urban and Regional Research*, *IJMES* and *MAUSS*.

De Vroey Michel is Professor of Economics at the Université catholique de Louvain in Belgium where he teaches the history of economic theories. He has held visiting positions at the Université Paris-I Panthéon-Sorbonne, Duke University and the Université de Montréal. His work has appeared in journals such as the *European Journal of the History of Economic Thought*, *History of Political Economy* and the *Journal of the History of Economic Thought*.

Dreier James is Associate Professor of Philosophy at Brown University. He is the author of a number of papers on meta-ethics and practical rationality.

Hansson Sven Ove is Associate Professor of Theoretical Philosophy at Uppsala University, Sweden. His major research interests are decision theory, philosophy of risk, and formal epistemology. His most recent work includes *A Textbook of Belief Dynamics* (Kluwer 1998) and *Setting the Limit* (Oxford University Press 1998).

Hausman Daniel M. is one of the founding editors of this journal. His most recent books are *The Inexact and Separate Science of Economics*, *Causal Asymmetries*, and (jointly with Michael McPherson) *Economic Analysis and Moral Philosophy*.

Irzik Gürol is Professor of Philosophy at Boğaziçi University. He specializes in philosophy of science and philosophy of social sciences. He has published articles on causal modelling in the social sciences, Carnap, Popper and Kuhn in such journals as the *British Journal for the Philosophy of Science*, *Philosophy of Science*, and *Studies in History and Philosophy of Science*.

Lawson Tony is a Lecturer in Economics at the University of Cambridge. He sits on numerous editorial boards and is organizer of the *Cambridge Workshop on Realism and Economics*. Much of his recent research is in the area of realist social theory, the most systematic presentation of which is found in his book *Economics and Reality* (Routledge, 1997).

McKelvey Richard is Wasserman Professor of Political Science at the California Institute of Technology, where he has been since 1979. His early work was on the

mathematical theory of voting and majority rule. More recently his research has centred on topics in game theory, such as common knowledge, implementation, computation of equilibria, game theory when individuals make errors, and experiments.

Medema Steven G. is Associate Professor of Economics at the University of Colorado at Denver. His primary research interests are the history of economic thought, law and economics, and public economics. He is the author of *Ronald H. Coase and Economics and the Law: From Posner to Post Modernism* (with Nicholas Mercuro) and editor of the *Journal of the History of Economic Thought*.

Mirowski Philip is Carl Koch Professor of Economics and the History and Philosophy of Science at the University of Notre Dame. He is the author of *More Heat than Light* and editor of *Natural Images in Economics*. He is finishing a book on the impact of the 'cyborg sciences' on late twentieth-century economics, a multivolume collected economics works of William Thomas Thornton, and a survey of the economics of science inquiry.

Page Talbot is Professor of Economics and Environmental Studies, at Brown University. Previously he was a research associate at Resources for the Future and at Caltech, and has taught at Caltech and the University of California at Los Angeles. His principal research interests are environmental economics, risk assessment, the economics of information, game theory and experimental economics.

Pietarinen Ahti is a research student in the School of Cognitive and Computing Sciences, University of Sussex. His research interests include the interplay of logic and games, game-theoretic semantics, epistemic logic and propositional attitudes.

Potts Gareth has a B.A. in Social Policy and Administration, a Masters in Town and Regional Planning and a Ph.D. in Economic Geography. He is currently a research fellow in the Geography Department of Reading University where he works on a four-university study of the relationships between economic competitiveness, social cohesion and the policy environment in the London region.

Sugden Robert is Leverhulme Research Professor at the University of East Anglia. His research uses a combination of theoretical, experimental and philosophical methods to investigate issues in the areas of welfare economics, social choice, choice under uncertainty, the foundations of decision theory and game theory, and the evolution of social conventions.

Vermont Samson is an attorney in Washington D.C.

Weirich Paul is Professor in the Philosophy Department at the University of Missouri-Columbia. He earned a Ph.D. at UCLA, and held a prior teaching position at the University of Rochester. In 1998 Cambridge University Press published his book, *Equilibrium and Rationality: Game Theory Revised by Decision Rules*.

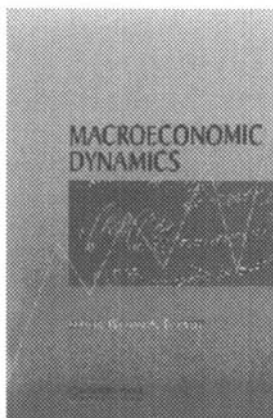

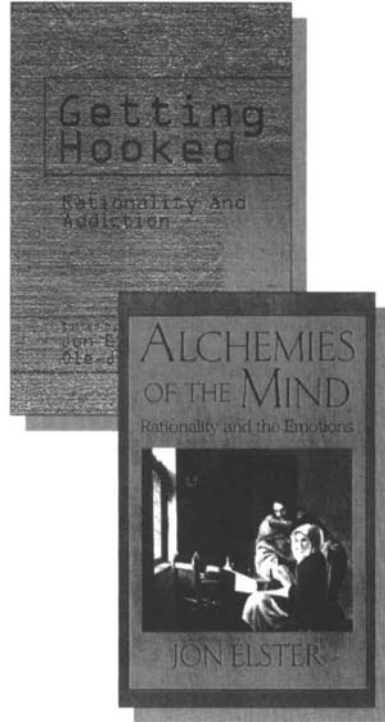

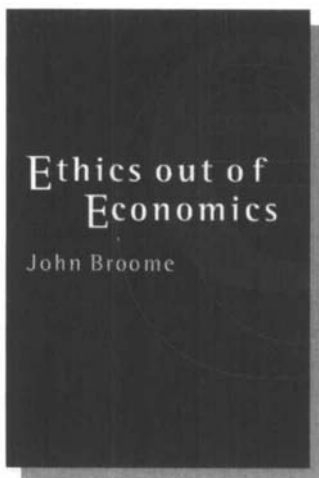
