NOTE

This is the sixth cumulative index to the *American Journal of International Law*, published by The American Society of International Law (Society). It covers Volumes 75 (1981) through 84 (1990). The five previous indexes cover the periods of 1907–1920, 1921–1940, 1941–1960, 1961–1970 and 1971–1980.

The Society's Director of Publications, Marilou M. Righini, coordinated the publication of this index, which included the efforts of Anna Ascher (creation of substantive entries), Susan F. Bassuener (production and promotion), Samuel Bettwy (editing, copyediting and proofreading), Rachel de la Vega (production and promotion) and Foxon–Maddocks Associates of Reston, Virginia (technical assistance and support). The entries of this index were compiled using Macrex™ indexing software (Bayside Indexing Service of Kensington, California).

The American Society of International Law is a membership association committed to the study and use of law in international affairs. Organized in 1906, the ASIL is a tax-exempt, nonprofit corporation headquartered in Tillar House on Sheridan Circle in Washington, D.C.

CITATIONS

This index covers Volumes 75–84 (1981–1990) of the *American Journal of International Law*. Citations to the *Journal* are indicated by the volume number (bold-faced), directly followed by the letter “J” (also bold-faced), followed by a space and the page number or numbers. Italicized page numbers indicate judicial decisions that are excerpted or discussed at length.

The citation may be preceded by an italicized abbreviation which indicates the section of the *Journal* where the cited material appears. The following are section abbreviations used in this index:
