The annual institutional subscription rate is \$30.00, postage included. Single issues of the Journal and Bibliography, beginning with the May 1965 issue; cost \$8.00 plus postage for non-members and can be ordered from the Secretariat. Earlier issues may be purchased from A.M.S. Reprints, 56 E. 13th Street, New York, New York 10003.

Annual membership dues are \$25.00 for Regular members, \$12.50 for Retired members and \$1.2.50 for Student members (full-time students for 5 years only). Regular, Retired, and Student members receive the Journal of Asian Studies and the Asian Studies Newsletter. Second-class postage paid at Ann Arbor, Michigan and at Richmond, Virginia.

Individual and back issues of the Journal and Bibliography to the membership cost \$6.00 plus postage for Regular members, and \$4.00 plus postage for Student and Retired members. Footnotes should be in the form recommended in the Style Sheet of the MLA (available from the Secretariat in Ann Arbor), typed double-spaced, and placed at the end of the manuscript. Manuscripts, including footnotes, should not be more than approximately 35 pages in length; the original and two clear copies should be submitted.

Books for review and correspondence concerning reviews should be sent to the appropriate editor. Books on Japan, Korea, and South Asia should be sent to the office of the editor; books on Southeast Asia should be sent to Professor A. B.
