WENDELL C. BENNETT MEMORIAL

On September 6, 1953 American archaeology and anthropology and the social sciences in general lost one of their most distinguished members and effective spokesmen, Wendell Clark Bennett. Dr. Bennett was justly famous for his outstanding studies in South American archaeology, for his curatorial work at the Bishop Museum and the American Museum of Natural History, and as a teacher at Wisconsin and Yale. He was a former president of the American Anthropological Association. His contributions to the activities of the Social Science Research Council, the National Research Council, and similar bodies will prove of lasting value to his colleagues and to future generations of anthropologists.

In dedicating a memorial to Wendell Bennett it was believed that a fitting tribute to the man from his many friends, would be the establishment of a fund to aid in the future education of his daughter, Martha, now age 12.
