The copper industry in Northern Rhodesia attracted thousands of migrant African workers, and also skilled miners from Europe and South Africa who formed their own trade union. The British-sponsored African trade union showed itself just as capable of causing trouble. The black workers associated freedom with high wages and the opening of jobs previously reserved for Europeans, and the conflict between their expectations and the economic realities of independence is built into many of Zambia's development problems today. £6 *Oxford Studies in African Affairs*

When a Sotho chief returned from battle, he or his adherents would compose praise-poems in his honour. Many of these have been collected, but very few have been translated into English, and there are now few Sotho who understand the full meaning of the words or recognize their historical allusions.
