International Kelly Prize in German Political Thought

The conference for the Study of Political Thought (CSPT) announces that the second annual George Armstrong Kelly Prize has been extended to include articles published in the years 1990 and 1991. The prize will be awarded for the best journal article, or paper of similar length and scope, published in those years on the history of 18th and/or 19th century German political thought (including political theory, philosophy, etc.). This is an international prize: entries will be accepted from any country, although the articles must be in French, German, English, or Spanish.

Individual authors are encouraged to submit their own work for consideration for the prize. Others are invited to nominate possible candidates for the prize. (Ordinarily there will be one prize for each calendar year; this year, because of problems associated with changes in institutional affiliation of both of the administrators, 1990 and 1991 have been combined.) Submissions for the 1990 prize will automatically be included in the combined 1990–1991 judging.

The deadline for submissions of 1990 and 1991 articles for the Prize is 10 November 1992. Four copies of articles in English, French, or Spanish should be sent to Professor John Christian Laursen, Department of Political Science, University of California, Riverside, CA, 92507–0118, USA. Four copies of articles in German should be sent to Professor Martyn P. Thompson, Department of Political Science, Tulane University, New Orleans, LA, 70118–5698, USA. Winner of the prize, which includes a cast grant, will be announced at the 1993 annual meeting of the CSPT.

The Conference Group for Central European History awards a biennial prize of \$500 for the best book in Central European History. Central European History is understood to include all German-speaking countries as well as areas previously included within the Habsburg Monarchy. This year the competition is open to books in English by permanent residents of North America, published in 1990 and 1991. Nominations should be submitted to the chair of the prize committee, Professor James Melton. The deadline for nominations is 15 September 1992, by which time copies of the prize entries should be sent to each member of the CGCEH prize committee. This year's members are Professor Rebecca Boehling, Department of History, University of Maryland-Baltimore County Campus, 5401 Wilkens Ave., Baltimore, MD 21228-5398; Professor Eric Kohler, Department of History, University of Wyoming, Laramie, WY 82071; and Professor James Melton (Chair), Department of History, Emory University, Atlanta, GA 30322. The award will be announced at the annual meeting of the AHA in Washington, DC in December 1992.

The Two Germanies 1945-1990

Problems of Interpretation

For forty years after their foundation in 1949, the two Germanies appeared, from the most unlikely origins, to have come to represent model instances of quite opposing types of state and society.

Given Germany's turbulent past, this double stability—in the seemingly frozen stasis of divided Europe in the Cold War era—was in itself remarkable enough. But then, with the collapse of Communist rule in East Germany's "gentle revolution" of 1989, a new twist was added to the peculiar course of German history. The fall of the Berlin Wall led ultimately to the reunification of these by now very different societies and economies. The new, united Germany of 1990 faced new challenges as unprecedented processes of transformation threw up a multitude of economic problems and social tensions.

Academic interpretations of the two Germanies have often both informed and been colored by wide controversies. In *The Two Germanies*, Dr. Fulbrook, Reader in German History at University College, London, charts a clear and informative course through the relevant areas of debate. She also provides the student with a useful guide to further reading.
