text and in illustrations a complete and illuminating presentation of the subject.

Naturally the chapters are somewhat unequal. In the section dealing with general diseases, that on tuberculosis is outstanding. It is interesting to note the satisfactory results that have been obtained by local treatment with artificial sunlight, as this procedure has not proved very successful in this country and more lasting results have been obtained by other and quicker methods. New growths of the larynx receive detailed notice and every variety of simple tumour is beautifully illustrated from cases that have occurred in the author's clinic, but the section on malignant disease is a little scanty and the statistics of operative results are a little out of date.

In the operative section tracheotomy is discussed at great length, no less than forty pages being devoted to it, whilst laryngo-fissure is dismissed in eight pages. On the other hand partial and complete laryngectomy are very well described, as are the various operations on the pharynx.

This is certainly a book that no laryngologist can afford to be without.


