Submission of manuscripts. In general, articles should not exceed 30 pages in length (including footnotes) of double-spaced text. They must be submitted in duplicate, **with footnotes placed at the end of the text**. The Modified Library of Congress system of Cyrillic transliteration should be used, and the University of Chicago Press *Manual of Style* should be consulted for purposes of style and footnoting. Where the subject matter refers to relatively recent events, please date your article.

All manuscripts are given to outside referees for evaluation in a process that assures anonymity. Decisions on publication are usually given within two months. During this interim, the editors assume the manuscript is not under consideration by any other journal. The editors reserve the right to edit all submissions. The final revised draft **must be submitted on a disk** (Macintosh/MicroSoftword), with one double-spaced printout.

Upon publication, authors receive a complimentary copy of the issue of *Nationalities Papers* as well as 50 offprints of their article. Because *Nationalities Papers* is a journal in part supported by subscriptions, all authors are encouraged to join the Association for the Study of Nationalities.
