ANNA FAZZARI, MBE
1912–1991

As John Ward-Perkins often said, ‘The School can carry on very nicely without me, but not without Anna’.

Anna Fazzari came to the British School at Rome in early 1946. She was the eldest of six daughters in a close, affectionate family, a family which had been connected with the Risorgimento and which continued to lead a busy social and cultural life. This was to prove an invaluable asset to the School. Having started as Library Assistant she became the Director’s Secretary in 1955. In this position she placed her wide acquaintance at the service of the School and thereby contributed enormously to its success not only in the difficult post-War years, but right down until her retirement in 1976. It seemed that there was no-one in Italy with whom Anna did not have links.

Her deep voice could be intimidating, but her indefatigable and unflappable approach to any problem rapidly dispelled any initial diffidence. Her tiny office became the hub of the School, even when filled with a cloud of Macedonian smoke. In 1965 Anna was awarded the MBE, which gave her great pleasure. She will be remembered by many, for she was a very special person.
