Hugh Last Fund and General Fund

Applications for grants are invited for financial assistance towards the undertaking, completion or publication of work that relates to any of the general scholarly purposes of the Roman Society, excluding expenses in connection with archaeological or other excavations or surveys, or travelling, hotel, conference or other living expenses of scholars.

Museum and Heritage Summer Placements

The Society offers a number of bursaries of £300 to support students undertaking a summer placement in a museum. Placements are normally held sometime during the summer vacation; the exact length and timing is to be agreed between the successful candidates and museums. Museums and other organisations that have hosted placements recently include the British Museum, the British School at Rome, Corbridge Roman site, the Great North Museum, the Roman Baths in Bath, the Corinium Museum, the Institute of Classical Studies, the University of London and English Heritage. Details of the 2021 scheme will be available on the Society's website from January.

All undergraduate and MA students are eligible to apply. Candidates should apply by letter setting out their reasons for wishing to undertake an internship and outlining any previous experience of working in a museum, and

providing the name and email address of a referee. Letters of application should be addressed to the Secretary of the Roman Society, and sent by email (office@romansociety.org) by 30 April 2021.

Schools Committee

The Schools Committee responds to issues concerning the teaching and examining of classics subjects in schools, teacher training and the provision of PGCEs. **Grants** to schools are available to help promote the teaching of Latin and Roman studies. Most of the grants are awarded for the purchase of textbooks and other books on Roman topics, but the Committee also makes awards to groups, museums and schools organising lectures or study days on Roman themes. Applications from schools planning to start courses in Latin are particularly welcome.

The annual budget is £18,000, and the usual level of award is £50 to £600. The Committee meets three times a year. Applications should be sent to the Secretary, by email (office@romansociety.org) to arrive by 1 February, 1 June or 1 November in any year. Archaeology Committee

The Archaeology Committee was formed in 1993. Its brief is to organise a regular conference to act 'as a forum where those interested in the archaeology of the Roman Empire and those more specifically concerned with Roman Britain' can come together. This initiative has led to a highly successful series of international conferences, held in the Universities of Reading, Nottingham, Durham, Glasgow, Leicester, Birmingham, London, Michigan (Ann Arbor), Oxford, Frankfurt, Rome and Edinburgh. The next Roman Archaeology Conference (RAC) will be in Split (2021).
