## Oryx 100% Fund Grants

The following grants from the 100% Fund were approved by Council at its meeting on 7 April 1983:

- £500** to Dr Hans Klingel for a study on the Nubian wild ass *Equus africanus africanus* with two aims: to obtain data on the wild population in order to formulate a conservation policy; and to assess the feasibility of organising a capture operation for a future captive-breeding group.
- £500** to Dr Hans Klingel for a three-year study of Grevy's zebra *Equus grevyi* in Kenya to determine its status and likely chances of survival.
- £500** to Nicholas Payne for his detailed assessment of the status of the fruit bat *Pteropus mariannus* on the Mariana Islands, where it is threatened by local hunting and commercial exploitation.
- £300** to Dr H.W. Walden for his survey of rare and endangered land molluscs in Madeira.
- £300** to David A. Curl for his background study of the angulated tortoise *Geochelone yniphora* in Madagascar, possibly the rarest tortoise on earth, in order to assess the threats to its survival and formulate conservation measures.
- £250** to Patrick Doncaster to study the marine otter *Lutra felina* in Chile, listed as vulnerable in the IUCN *Red Data Book*, to assess the threats from illegal hunting, and alleged damage to prawn fisheries.
- £200** to Rodney Jackson to study the activity patterns, home ranges, and prey relationships of the endangered snow leopard *Panthera uncia* in the Langu Valley in west Nepal.
- £100** to Adam Gretton for his intensive ringing programme on the little bittern and other breeding reed-bed bird species in Kashmir, in order to assess survival rates by comparison with a similar programme in 1978.
- £100** to M. Kelsey to study six threatened bird species and assess the human pressures on their habitat in the Arabuko-Sokoko forest reserve and the Gedi ruins in south-east Kenya.

## Linnean Society Library

The Linnean Society has kindly agreed to extend access to its library to members of the ffPS. The Library is housed in Burlington House, Piccadilly, London and is one of the finest natural history libraries in the world. Many of the journals and periodicals received by the ffPS are passed on to the Linnean Society. Members of ffPS wishing to use the library should write to the Executive Secretary of ffPS for a letter of introduction.

## Wildlife Illustrator of the Year Exhibition

*Wildlife Magazine*, in conjunction with the ffPS, is presenting an exhibition of the winning and highly commended entries, from which the ffPS will be selecting its 1983 Christmas cards, from the *Wildlife* Illustrator of the Year Competition. There will also be paintings by Sir Peter Scott and Jonathan Kingdon and a display of the first British wildlife Christmas cards.

The exhibition will be open to the public at the British Museum (Natural History), Cromwell Road, London, from 2–31 August 1983.

## Fauna and Flora Preservation Society Annual Report and Accounts 1982

### Council

The 78th Annual General Meeting was held on 8 September and six new members were elected to fill vacancies on Council: Brian Jackman of the *Sunday Times*, who has been of immense value in publicising ffPS's major campaigns; Stuart Johnstone, who returned after an absence of one year; Jonathan Kingdon, who recently completed the monumental *Mammals of East Africa*; Jeremy Mallinson, who is the Zoological Director of the Jersey Wildlife Preservation Trust; The Hon. Vincent Weir, who inaugurated the Otter Haven Project; and Sir Peter Watkin Williams, Chief Justice of St Helena and Judge of the Falkland Islands, who has a special interest in the botany of the islands. Dr David Bellamy was elected as a Vice-President from his former position as Council member.

### International meetings

In 1982 the Society was represented by: the Vice-Chairman at the International Whaling Commission in Brighton, UK; the Vice-Chairman and Executive Secretary at the ICBP World Conference in Cambridge, UK; the Hon. Editor at the Species Survival Commission meetings in Gland, Switzerland and Kuala Lumpur and the Editor at the European Environmental Bureau meeting in Brussels.

### Representation on other bodies

The Society maintained an active presence on the following bodies: Conservation Liaison Committee; CoEnCo (Council for Environmental Conservation); Wildlife Link Committee of CoEnCo and all its subgroups; European Environmental Bureau; the Federation of Zoological Gardens; International Council for Bird Preservation; Joint Otter Group; the Primate Society of Great Britain; the Mammals Committee; the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food Consultative Panel on Badgers and TB; Advisory Committee on Oil Pollution of the Sea; International Union for Conservation of Nature and Natural Resources; IUCN's Species Survival Commission; Rare Breeds Survival Trust; International Whaling

Commission; British Herpetological Society, Conservation Committee; and the Meeting of the parties to the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES).

### ffPS Inc.

The Society continued to expand its activities in the United States following the opening of its office in Ayer, Massachusetts in 1981.

### Office work

In February Kay Williams ceased to handle the accounts and membership department and the Zoological Society of London took on the responsibility. Sue Oddy, who joined the Society in 1980, left in October. In December Susan Ward joined the Society as the new Membership Secretary.

### Membership

At the end of 1982 there were 3925 members comprising: 2634 Ordinary members, 367 Student members, 136 Benefactors, 15 Family members, 165 Institutional, 214 members through trade channels and 394 Life members.

### Members' meetings

At the 78th Annual General Meeting, on 8 September, Dr Sidney Holt, Vice-Chairman for Marine Affairs of the IUCN Species Survival Commission's Committee, gave a talk on the real threats to whales and seals, and Mike Salisbury, Producer of the BBC's Natural History Unit, presented the BBC film *Animal Olympians*.

Four other London meetings were held, each with a wine and cheese buffet supper. On 7 April a meeting was held jointly with the Falkland Islands Foundation with illustrated talks by Ron Lewis Smith of the British Antarctic Survey on a biological survey of Beauchene Island, Professor David Moore of Reading University on the plants of the Falklands, and Julian Fitter on conservation and tourism in the islands. The Anglia Survival film *Penguin Christmas* was also shown.

Following the success of the ffPS Monk Seal Appeal, on 7 July, Dr Thomas Schultze-Westrum talked to members and showed his own film

about the conservation of the seals. Brian Jackman, who had helped to publicise the project through the *Sunday Times*, was a special guest. Since this was a Zoo open night, members were able to walk in the gardens during the evening. On 23 September a joint meeting with the Scientific Officers' Association of the British Museum (Natural History) took place at the Museum. Sir Peter Scott gave an informal talk on his personal observations of wildlife and presented a selection of his slides. After the buffet supper Sir Peter signed copies of his books. Conservation in SE Asia was the theme of a meeting on 23 November. Dr David Chivers gave an overview of the conservation of SE Asian primates, Dick Vane-Wright gave an illustrated talk on deforestation problems for SE Asian butterflies, and Clive Jermy spoke on botanical aspects of the Mulu Expedition.

Two symposia were also held. On Saturday, 27 March ffPS joined with the Botanical Society of the British Isles to hold an afternoon symposium on endangered fauna and flora—habitat conservation in Europe. Lord Craigton chaired the first session and papers were given on: threatened habitats of Britain by David Goode of the NCC; Greek flora by Hugh Syngé of the Threatened Plants Committee; and the Common Agricultural Policy and its effects on wildlife and habitats by Alastair Gammel of the RSPB. Dr Chris Humphries of the Botany Section of the Natural History Museum and ffPS Council member, chaired the second session when the subjects of papers included: European conservation, by Chris Leon of the Threatened Plants Committee; woodland conservation: priorities and practice, by Dr Keith Kirby of the NCC; and the problems of insect conservation by Dr M.G. Morris of the Institute for Terrestrial Ecology. Richard Mabey's film *The Flowering of Britain* was shown after the buffet supper, courtesy of the BBC Natural History Unit.

On Saturday, 27 November a one-day symposium on 'Introductions' was held jointly with the Mammal Society and the British Herpetological Society. Sir Christopher Lever opened the symposium with, Introductions: reasons, results and criteria with special reference to mammals, and other papers included: green frogs and other illegal immigrants, by Trevor Beebee, feral mink in Britain—the first 25 years, and conservation of

declining UK herpetofauna—successful re-introduction techniques by Keith Corbett.

### ffPS Cambridge Group

During 1982 the ffPS Cambridge Group was inaugurated on 12 November at a joint meeting with the Cambridge Natural History Society in the Department of Applied Biology, Cambridge. Sir Peter Scott, the guest speaker, gave an illustrated talk entitled 'Conservation—where do we go from here?' and the films *The Hunters of Okavango* and *The Return of the Fur Seal* were shown. The Group's Committee members consist of Dr David Chivers (Chairman), Dr S.K. Eltringham (Vice-Chairman), Robert Burton (Secretary), Susan Wells and Sheila Anderson (Co-Treasurers), J. Hammond (Cambridge Natural History Society representative), Dr Tim Clutton-Brock, Professor Peter Jewell and Dr R.E. Stebbings.

### Flora

The Society continued to expand its activities in flora conservation and launched a major study to investigate the international trade in mahogany. A project relating to the flora of St Helena was also given full funding which enabled Quentin Cronk of the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew, and a propagator from Kew, to go to St Helena to undertake this work.

### Oryx 100% Fund

In 1982, 46 applications for funding were received, of which 25 were approved by Council. A total of £4858.81 was allocated to projects in 1982. In addition, approximately £6500 was spent on the Mountain Gorilla Project.

### Mountain Gorilla Project

In 1982 ffPS continued to support the Mountain Gorilla Project, employing a field officer, Roger Wilson, and an assistant, Regine Dedonder, in the Parc National des Volcans, Rwanda. The Rwandan government maintained its support for the project, and the national tourist agency (ORTPN) worked in close cooperation with project field-workers. Roger and Regine supervised the continued habituation of gorilla group 11 on Mount

Visoke and its exposure to tourists, as well as helping with the local environmental conservation education programme. With the two other gorilla groups still successfully habituated to tourists, under the supervision of Mark Condiotti and project manager, Jean-Pierre von der Becke of AWLF, the park attracted a total of 4132 visitors (of which 3039 saw the gorillas) compared to 3686 in 1981. The visitors were from Europe, USA, Australia, Colombia, Bolivia, Tunisia as well as Rwanda itself. The revenue from tourism (approximately £60,400) continued to allow ORTPN to employ guides for the tourists and guards for the anti-poaching patrols. Although the habituated groups and those monitored by the Karisoke Research Station were adequately protected, poaching for game by trap-setting continued to be a danger throughout the park. In November, a non-habituated group of gorillas was attacked by poachers who killed the silverback male, badly wounded a female and captured their one-month-old infant. ORTPN guards were able to recover her from the poachers almost immediately and take her to Roger and Regine, until her future could be decided. The incident emphasised the urgent need to extend the project into Zaire, where poaching is still rife, in order to protect more of the gorillas' ranges. In 1983 it is hoped that progress will be made in this area. Early in the year a \$2500 grant from WWF-US enabled Roger and Regine to build a house inside the park, to replace the existing small and inadequate accommodation, thus making their work easier and more effective. The exhaustion of the original fund in July led us to increase fund-raising efforts. As well as a steady stream of donations, two appeals in the *Daily Mirror* and in *Oryx* produced enough funds to continue ffPS's part of the project until the end of the year. In addition, the *Daily Mirror* donated £1000, and the International Primate Society \$1000.

### Mediterranean Monk Seal Appeal

The money raised at the end of 1981 was donated to the Fishermen's Cooperative on the island of Alonissos in the Northern Sporades. The fishermen, in consultation with Dr Thomas Schultze-Westrum, agreed that the money should be used to build a cold-store for the benefit

of the entire fishing community, and the event was commemorated by a plaque. As a result of the ffPS initiative, considerable progress for the conservation of Mediterranean monk seals has been made, and in June 1982, supported by Charioteer Travel and Town and Gown Travel, the Executive Secretary visited the Sporades and northern Greece to plan a tour for members of ffPS. Unfortunately this has not materialised due to lack of support. By the end of 1982 the European Parliament had started to take an active interest in the conservation of the Mediterranean monk seal, and a long-term conservation programme at last looks like becoming a reality.

### 1982 Record Birdwatch

Once again an ffPS team, which included TV's Bill Oddie, challenged *Country Life* under strictly controlled conditions (so that birds were not unduly disturbed). The records were again broken, and over £5000 raised for conservation. Towards the end of 1982 Cyril Walker took on the responsibility of sponsorship and began work on the 1983 Record Birdwatch.

### Charity Gala

On 19 May the ffPS, together with the International Trust for Nature Conservation, benefited from a Charity Gala preview performance of *The Pirates of Penzance* at the Drury Lane Theatre, in the presence of HRH Mrs Mark Phillips and HRH the Duke of Edinburgh. The event was a resounding success and raised almost £1500 for ffPS.

### Publicity

The activities of the Society continued to attract publicity and were mentioned in numerous newspaper articles. The Executive Secretary made several broadcasts, discussing the Society's activities. The Hedgehog and Bat stickers attracted sustained publicity, and helped to recruit many new members.

### Sales

Our new card, a full-colour design depicting a hummingbird and passion flowers, generously donated to the Society by Jonathan Kingdon, was printed in time for Christmas sales. Once again Edward Wright generously produced a full-

colour calender on behalf of the Society, with photographs donated by Bruce Coleman. New sales items included a range of jewellery designed especially for the Society by Rosemary Zeeman — monk seal and tortoise silver stud earrings, and orchid and monarch butterfly enamel-on-silver brooches. The ffPS specially designed stickers, *Don't Squash Me!* (Hedgehog) and *Bats Need Friends* continued to sell very well, along with a new design, again donated by Jan Pienkowski—*I Bats*.

### Film Library

To give the best service, the ffPS Film Library was transferred to the World Wildlife Fund in the middle of 1982.

### Oryx

There were three issues of *Oryx* in 1982. At the end of the year negotiations were concluded with Blackwell Scientific Publications to print and publish the journal quarterly in conjunction with the Society.

### Legacies and Gifts—Oryx 100% Fund

Gifts to the 100% Fund in 1982 totalled £21,229·28 of which £11,622·69 was earmarked for the Mountain Gorilla Project; £1070·80 earmarked for the Mediterranean Monk Seal Project and £400·00 earmarked for the Mahogany Study. Details of the many gifts were given in *Oryx* XVI, Nos 3, 4 and 5, pp. 294, 371 and 465.

### Legacies and Gifts—General Fund

Gifts to the General Fund totalled £16,015·86, including legacies of £2208·51. Details in *Oryx*, as for *Oryx* 100% Fund gifts above.

A magnificent gift of £1000 from our long-time member, Miss Eileen Gibbs enabled the Council to launch an *Oryx* Endowment Fund, the income from which will support the Editor's salary and expenses.
