Part of the work of a philosophy journal is applying for grants. The *Canadian Journal of Philosophy's* application last year to the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada – an application that was successful – produced some statistical information that may be of interest to readers.

In the three years 1992-94, the *CJP* received 34% of its submissions from Canadian authors and 66% from non-Canadians. Of the articles accepted during this period, 33% were by Canadians and 67% by non-Canadians. The closeness of these two pairs of figures attests, I think, to the integrity of the journal's blind review process. In that process, the *CJP* used 292 different referees in 1992-94, only eight more than four times. The journal's acceptance rates during these years were 11% (1992), 11% (1993), and 6% (1994).
