SYRACUSE UNIVERSITY wishes to announce its 1975 Summer Seminar in East Africa, co-sponsored by the Division of International Programs Abroad and the Program of Eastern African Studies. The program consists of approximately three weeks of residence work in Nairobi and three weeks traveling in Kenya and Tanzania. Numerous sites of recent historical importance will be visited. The Seminar offers 6 hours of credit and is open to both graduate and undergraduate students. Dates are in the process of being finalized, but it is likely that they will comprise July 15 to August 26 inclusive. ## NEWS FROM FOREIGN RESEARCH INSTITUTES

### INSTITUTE FOR DEVELOPMENT RESEARCH (Copenhagen).

The Institute for Development Research (IDR) was established in 1969 to undertake and publish research on economic and social problems of developing countries, including investigation and evaluation of the development assistance of Denmark and other countries. The Institute is an independent institution governed by a research council of 20 members representing universities, other academic institutions, and DANIDA, the Danish International Development Agency. It receives an annual grant from the Danish government of 2.6 million kroner (\$370,000). A director, research director, eight full-time research fellows, research assistants, a librarian, and secretarial assistants complete the staff. The first research program of IDR was outlined and endorsed by the Research Council in 1969.

In addition to research, the Institute conducts seminars and lectures which have included such topics as development policies in China and Latin America, and rural development in East Africa.
